Some of these are due to new construction, but many are people who are buying homes that belonged to long term residents that have either returned north for health reasons, or have passed away. Welcome to the new residents! I am confident that you will find the Caracol to be a location that is getting better every year. Infrastructure improvements and ongoing maintenace, along with increased security make for a desirable place to live in San Carlos. As always our motivation is to keep the hill *Safe*, *Peaceful* and *Secure*. So as summer starts to wind down, and you snow birds start to return to the hill, keep your eyes open for the new residents and say "Hi"!

The water "situation" on the hill is slowly starting to improve. Reports I have received indicated that "sufficient" water is now flowing to the hill, though still far from normal. Tom

Barrow (of Re/Max) posted a note in their newsletter about coming improvements to the water infrastructure that supplies water to San Carlos. Tom reported the following:

Three new wells in the Valiente aquifer have been dug. Studies claim that the aquifer should be able to supply these wells for 100 years. Each well has a capacity of 70 liters/sec. CEA is go to supply 150 liters/sec to San Carlos. A water line from the new wells will be joined with the current line located near the intersection of Delfinario road. The plan is to have this new water supply to San Carlos, operational by Semana Santa 2019.

We shall see if this will be a real change for San Carlos.

The association is still looking for a couple of volunteers to take over the refurbishment of the streetlights on the Caracol. Please consider helping out. It requires a few days every six month or so. Some skills with Spanish would be helpful.
